



How to count from 11 to 20 in Spanish

Welcome to a new session of the Learning Spanish for Beginners Podcast.

In this session, we will learn **how to count from 11 to 20 in Spanish**, and we will review a few examples that can be used in everyday life.

Let's get started!



Numbers from 11 to 20 in Spanish:

Numbers in Spanish from 11 to 20 can be divided in 3 different groups that share common characteristics:

In Group 1, the first five numbers are from **11 to 15**. They all end with “c,e” and begin with letters that resemble their equivalent numbers from 1 to 5.

Here are the numbers from 11 to 15:

- 11 – once
- 12 – doce
- 13 – trece
- 14 – catorce
- 15 – quince

In Group 2, the numbers from 16 to 19 begin with “dieci” and end with the corresponding numbers from 6 to 9.

As a note, “dieci” sounds like “diez y,” which means “10 and”.

If you look at 17, which is “diecisiete” in Spanish, it sounds like “diez y siete” or “10 and 7” in English.

Now, let’s look at the numbers from 16 to 19:

- 16 – dieciséis
- 17 – diecisiete
- 18 – dieciocho
- 19 – diecinueve



Group 3 consists of the number 20, which in Spanish is “veinte”.

Here’s the number 20 in Spanish one more time:

- 20 – veinte

Now, let’s review the numbers in Spanish from 11 to 20 one more time.

- 11 – once
- 12 – doce
- 13 – trece
- 14 – catorce
- 15 – quince
- 16 – dieciséis
- 17 – diecisiete
- 18 – dieciocho
- 19 – diecinueve
- 20 – veinte



Let's review a few examples that include numbers from 11 to 20:

11 - Once:

- Tengo once libros.
- I have eleven books.
- Tengo once libros.

12 - Doce:

- Ella compró doce manzanas.
- She bought twelve apples.
- Ella compró doce manzanas.

13 - Trece:

- Visitamos trece países el año pasado.
- We visited thirteen countries last year.
- Visitamos trece países el año pasado.

14 - Catorce:

- La reunión es el catorce de marzo.
- The meeting is on august 14.
- La reunión es el catorce de marzo.



15 - Quince:

- Marcó quince goles esta temporada.
- He scored fifteen goals this season.
- Marcó quince goles esta temporada.

16 - Dieciséis:

- Hay dieciséis estudiantes en la clase.
- There are sixteen students in the class.
- Hay dieciséis estudiantes en la clase.

17 - Diecisiete:

- Mi hermana tiene diecisiete años.
- My sister is seventeen years old.
- Mi hermana tiene diecisiete años.

18 - Dieciocho:

- Nos encontraremos en el piso dieciocho.
- We will meet on the eighteenth floor.
- Nos encontraremos en el piso dieciocho.

19 - Diecinueve:

- Ella tiene diecinueve primos.
- She has nineteen cousins.
- Ella tiene diecinueve primos.



20 - Veinte:

- Puedo contar hasta veinte.
- I can count to twenty.
- Puedo contar hasta veinte.
