



How to count from 21 to 30 in Spanish

Welcome to a new session of the Learning Spanish for Beginners Podcast.

In this session, we will learn **How to count from 21 to 30 in Spanish**, and we will review a few examples that can be used in everyday life.

Let's get started!



Numbers from 21 to 30 in Spanish:

The numbers in Spanish from 21 to 30 can be divided in 2 groups:

In Group 1, the numbers in Spanish between 21 and 29 are formed by the word “venti” and the equivalent number from 1 to 9 right next to it.

As a note, “venti” sounds similar to “veinte y,” which means “twenty and.”

If you say “24” in Spanish, which is “veinticuatro,” it sounds as if you said “veinte y cuatro,” which translates as twenty and four.

This will make things easier as you learn these numbers.

Now, let’s look at the numbers from 21 to 29:

- 21 – veintiuno
- 22 – veintidós
- 23 – veintitrés
- 24 – veinticuatro
- 25 – veinticinco
- 26 – veintiséis
- 27 – veintisiete
- 28 – veintiocho
- 29 – veintinueve



Group 2 consists of the number 30, which in Spanish is treinta.

Here it is one more time:

- 30 – treinta

Now, let's take a moment to review the numbers in Spanish from 21 to 30 one more time.

- 21 – veintiuno
- 22 – veintidós
- 23 – veintitrés
- 24 – veinticuatro
- 25 – veinticinco
- 26 – veintiséis
- 27 – veintisiete
- 28 – veintiocho
- 29 – veintinueve
- 30 – treinta



Now, let's review a few examples with these numbers. Here we go:

21 - Veintiuno:

- Tengo veintiún libros en mi librero.
- I have twenty-one books on my bookshelf.
- Tengo veintiún libros en mi librero.

22- Veintidós:

- Hay veintidós estudiantes en la clase.
- There are twenty-two students in the class.
- Hay veintidós estudiantes en la clase.

23 - Veintitrés:

- Mi primo tiene veintitrés años.
- My cousin is twenty-three years old.
- Mi primo tiene veintitrés años.

24 - Veinticuatro:

- La tienda está abierta veinticuatro horas al día.
- The store is open twenty-four hours a day.
- La tienda está abierta veinticuatro horas al día.

25 - Veinticinco:

- El regalo costó veinticinco dólares.
- The gift cost twenty-five dollars.
- El regalo costó veinticinco dólares.



26 - Veintiséis:

- Hoy es el veintiséis de noviembre.
- Today is the twenty-sixth of November.
- Hoy es el veintiséis de noviembre.

27- Veintisiete:

- Hay veintisiete sillas en el salón de clases.
- There are twenty-seven chairs in the classroom.
- Hay veintisiete sillas en el salón de clases.

28 - Veintiocho:

- El calendario muestra veintiocho días en febrero.
- The calendar shows twenty-eight days in February.
- El calendario muestra veintiocho días en febrero.

29 - Veintinueve:

- Veintinueve personas asistieron a la reunión.
- Twenty-nine people attended the meeting.
- Veintinueve personas asistieron a la reunión.

30 - Treinta:

- Tengo treinta monedas en mi bolso.
- I have thirty coins in my bag.
- Tengo treinta monedas en mi bolso.
